Free online courses offer new knowledge for health emergencies in 2024

Two new courses are available on WHO's free OpenWHO.org platform to help strengthen the response to health emergencies through key areas: readiness and gender perspectives.

In February, OpenWHO launched a one-hour training for stakeholders involved in <u>Health Emergencies Readiness</u> for Response Operations or HERO. It offers a certificate and more than 3600 people have already enrolled from across the globe.

The course is based on extensive discussions with regional and headquarters colleagues under the leadership of Dr Nedret Emiroglu, Director of the Country Readiness and Strengthening Department. Emiroglu said learners should enrol to understand the basics and benefits of readiness: the country's ability to anticipate and respond rapidly to imminent threats.

The training emphasizes the importance of acting before predictable shocks and promotes proactive cooperation across all stakeholders. It serves as the cornerstone for fostering readiness for response operations.

"Communities, where emergencies occur, play a crucial role, leveraging local knowledge and resources," Emiroglu said. "It is crucial to increase awareness about readiness at all levels as it is everyone's responsibility. We are much stronger and safer when we are ready together."

In March, OpenWHO also launched a groundbreaking certificate course on <u>taking</u> sex and gender into account in infectious <u>disease programmes</u>.

Dr Stella Chungong, Chair of the WHO Health Emergencies Programme (WHE) Gender Working Group, said the course embodies WHE's vision to help countries mainstream gender in all programmes for more genderequitable and effective outcomes. It aims to empower public health professionals, policymakers and programme managers at all levels, and highlights the link between gender and power imbalances to prevent sexual exploitation, abuse and harassment.

"If you are committed to the cause of gender mainstreaming in health emergencies and are looking to make a meaningful impact, we highly recommend this course," Chungong said. "Join us on this transformative journey today!"

Data spotlight: Impact of the Leadership in Emergencies programme

WHE's Leadership in Emergencies learning programme, now in its sixth year, kicked off 2024 with two new cohorts: 106 people are participating in a Phase 1 online course that concludes this month, while 28 attended a workshop in Türkiye from 3-7 March as part of an intensive Phase 2 course led by the Eastern Mediterranean Region and supported by the WHO European Centre for Preparedness for Humanitarian and Health Emergencies.

The graphics below provide a snapshot of the impact of the hybrid learning programme, which has trained nearly 500 people since it launched in 2019.

73% deployed in emergency response

Out of **82** participants surveyed:

33% promoted at work

57% moved to a more challenging assignment

92% more likely to put forward for new work or development opportunities
